Dear Sir,-

I have intercepted a letter from Judge Lindley to you dated Aug. 28th on the above subject, one paragraph of which is as follows: "You say nothing about the King extra lateral and its invasion. We imagine that the question of the position of the vein as it crosses into the Viola or San Carlos is an uncomfortably close one. Have you anything to suggest in regard to the King".

I know that it is likely to be difficult at present to prove that we have any of the apex of the vein in the King ground, and that the Empire State Co. would be able to make a better defence as against that claim than they could against the Tyler. Nevertheless it seems to me that it would be well to include the King with the Tyler in the present action, because if we do not so include it, we shall have to begin all over again in order to save the King if we win on the Tyler. This would mean a delay in getting action on the King for a long time, and in the meantime all the ore in that ground might be worked out by the Empire State Co., who, by reincorporation or some other dodge, could escape from all responsibility. On the other hand I think that it is quite probable that we could make such a showing for the King as would entitle us to an injunction restraining the Empire State Co. from working in that ground pending the issue of a suit. I sent you a telephone message this morning suggesting the above. When I hear from you I will be governed by your views in replying to Judge Lindley's letter.
