STEMWINDER CASE.

Dear Sir,-

Referring to yours of 20th written on the train. The work on J. M. Porter's new model was not begun when you were here because the map on which it is to be built up was not ready. This map has now been completed (I am sending you blue-print of it today) and the work on the model has begun. It will be finished in ample time for the trial of the case. You will be able to see from the blue-print just what the model will show.

Enclosed I hand you blue print showing the result of Fassett's sampling on the surface of the Stemwinder. There are some minute quantities of silver found at a few points in the hanging country where it was expected that none would be found, but these trifling results are no indication of a vein. As you will notice, there is no lead found in the hanging country west of line No. 7, while on that ~~line~~ three points show lead, two of them in considerable quantities.

This line might be taken to represent the limit of the vein on the hanging wall side and the limit on the foot wall would appear to be about on line No. 11, although there are one or two silver assays obtained east of No. 11. The lines named would give a width of about 200 feet on the surface, and the actual width of the vein at right angles to its dip would be about the same.
