Dear Sir,

As you will have seen from the weekly reports the progress of operations this month indicates a probable surplus of \$40,000. The Roberts stope is our chief reliance just now, both as to tonnage and grade. Without it we could not make much of a showing as the other stopes are yielding poor ore all round.

In the matter of the Steuwinder case - Lindley leaves D.F. tomorrow & will reach Spokane on 21<sup>st</sup> and will probably come to Wardner 24<sup>th</sup> or 25<sup>th</sup>.

Uren came about 10 days ago & is at work making surveys & a map on 20' scale.

All the other maps required of Porter, and the model, are completed. Lee has taken surface samples & assayed them. He did not find any values in F<sub>2</sub> & F<sub>13</sub>, & I

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have had Fassett resample these two holes - & think he will find blanks this time. I2 is close to, but not on, the triangle at N.W. cor. of Steamwinder, & I13 is below the I.W.

Fred G. Dudley, expert, is here making a preliminary examination - he seems a little dubious about the case & may withdraw - will know in a day or so. Rieger will probably be here in a few days. Jack Smith is coming up today - was here last week. He wrote me yesterday that Mike Carlin is in Spottawndrunt. Evidently the other side has proved too smart for Stephens, & we are out and injured. Allen will have Devine & Dyer here on time.

Frank Jenkins wrote that he would come if he could arrange his business, &c &c. Seems independent, but will come, I think. Loring said he would

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come when required, & I told him to come by 25<sup>th</sup> inst. Have asked Martin Curran to be here by that date also. Have heard nothing from Clement. He was in Salt Lake lately, and yesterday a cablegram was received here from his wife - so he apparently expects to be here. I hope you will get around in time. It is possible that the case may be reached by Nov. 1<sup>st</sup>, but it may be later. Lindley hopes it will be later as he needs more time. If he lacks preparation at this late hour it will be very shabby treatment of us.

Heyburn threatens to sue us under injunction in the matter of our Reed Tunnel water. McBride advises that we are entitled to the water. and Lindley has sent me a parallel case, from which it would seem that our

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position is correct.

No sign yet of Clark's experts to make the examinations under the proposed scheme to acquire C. & A. mines.

The papers report that Senator Shoup is coming here shortly. Will see him if he comes.
