Dear Sir:-

We want you to immediately hunt up and send here a man for the following purposes: As you know, all our maps have been destroyed; we have however, and can procure, complete field notes, from which the maps we require can be reproduced. We also have in our employ one mine surveyor and two surface surveyors, who can go out and survey up any missing links required. The man you are to send us must be an expert mapper, and preferably have had experience in the U.S. Surveyor General's office on patent work. He must be a man whose records you can thoroughly look into, as we do not want any of our maps sold to our enemies. He must also be a man willing to come up here and live at our mine boarding house, and stay there continuously until after the trial of our Stemwinder case next October.
