Wardner, Idaho, Sept. 2nd 1900.

Operative had an interview with Victor Price, Secy. of the miners' Union of Wardner, and was informed that he was notified by Ed. Boyce, of Butte City, not to hold any meetings for a while, for since the books were taken at the Gem Union, IOO permits have been carried away, and it has put all the local unions on the lookout, for they do not want any more of their papers made public.

Operative states that a man by the name of Hutcherson, of Wallace, Idaho, informed him that all schemes are being worked to locate those eight men who were let out of the Bull Pen at Kellogg, Idaho; that nobody knows where they are, but that he (Hutcherson) knows Joe Suman is one of them, and that he went to Fort Sumpter, Ore. to work in the Mines, but did not know what he was doing now. Mr. Hutcherson informed operative that all of these eight men were being looked for, but would never be found, as the W. F. M. is keeping them out of the way. The only danger to be apprehended would be a raid on the Unions, for the purpose of getting their books in order to procure information from them, but the boys are getting on to their scheme, and they will never get any more of their books. The first time they undertake to do as they did at Gem, there will be blood shed, and lots of it, for all the Unions are getting incensed over this last outrage.
