Seattle, Wash., November 12, 1900.

Operative reports that the Wardner Miners' Union held a meeting on Monday evening, November 5, 1900, but beyond giving a few instructions concerning the approaching election, no business of importance was transacted. Operative reports that he was appointed to keep tally on the ballots as they were counted. In a letter from a man by the name of McGrath, of Butte, to the Wardner Union he says that the Standard Oil Co. has a very dangerous spy in the Couer d' Alenes, who is a Jewess by the name of Keating. McGrath says that she was ordered to leave Butte and went away without any trouble.

O'Roick, father of Dennis O'Roick, who has just returned from Alaska says that he will make out an affidavit that he saw at Seattle, Wash., a contract signed by the B. & E. Sullivan Co. to a certain employment agency to send them after election, 2000 Japs to work in and out of the Mines.

C. S. Stratten however, says that the election has prevented the importation of these men for we have every one of our officers elected, except the sheriff and one county commissioner. Stratten says that our new Governor, Hunt, will not allow any Japs to come into this state in such large bodies.

Operative reports that he was in Wallace, Id. on November 7th, where he went to work with Jack Cockern, Al Smith and Jim Evans who say "that the union men will have things their own way more than they have had and another thing, these damn soldiers will soon be called in now just as quick as Hunt takes the chair and these damn dupetys will have to go too."
