Opr. reports: that he had an interview with George Lamb who works on the fourth level of the Mammoth Mine, Lamb says that the Mine is in a very dangerous condition and that he as well as others have laid off until the Mine can be made safe, that the Mammoth Co. had no more regard for a mans life than they had for a mule.

Opr. looked for Gfanahan on each train that came in from Burke on the

27th and 28th but saw nothing of him.

Opr. went to Burke and found that Granahan had been there in company with Jim Monroe X X X B. C. (an old timer in the Coeur D'Alenes but has been away for several months in British Columbia) Opr learned that Monroe and Granahan went to Mullan to-day.

Opr. was with Arthur Wallace during the evening and learned from him that there was a lot of old timers coming in from Montana to do assessment

work.

Opr. observed Pat Rogers X X M who works on the Snow Storm Mine, and who was arrested for being implicated in the shooting of Reputy Rose at Mullan, go into Dr. Worthentons office where he remained for about thirty minutes, and on coming out it was observed that he had a bundle about four inches aquare, that smelled of iodifome, (this Dr. is supposed to be the one that attended the man that was shot at Mullan by Deputy Williams and was carried away to a place of safty by his friends.)

Wardner Idaho, May 31, 1901.

Opr. reports: that he had an interview with John Whitmore of Boise City who says that an application for pardon for Paul Corcoran will soon be acted upon.

Whitmore says that Paul Corcoran was convicted at a time when passion and prejudice were at a fever heat, and that there was no direct evidence against him, that he participated in the Wardner riot but he happened to be Sec! y of the Burke Miners Union and was convicted because of his office

and not because of his conduct.

John Eliott and Mike O'grady have gone to Mullan to stay awhile and will be back to Kellogg about June 15th, they told Opr. before leaving that things were coming out all right and that Finley would soon have to

answer for the killing of Fisher, as they would soon have things run down.

Opr. heard a letter read from Ed. Boyce addressed to the Wardner Union in which he stated that there were over three hundred members present at the Denver Convention, and would remain there for about three weeks.

He also stated in his letter that the Western Federation of Miners

has had an increase of 27 new Unions, embracing a thousand men during the last year, and that the total membership of the organization was now fifty thousand.
