Henrietta Young of Boise placed first in the women's giant slalom with 46 3-5 seconds; Jayne Brown, second, with 46 4-5; Olga Rothchild, third, with 48 2-5.

The regional meet to be held Sunday is to determine the six best skiers to compete in the all-Idaho meet at Sun Valley January 14 and 15. The state teams will compete in a nine-state meet at Sun Valley January 21 and 22. All meets will be combined slalom,
