penditure from this source amounted to the stupendous sum of \$23,100,000 according to the bureau. The per capita income from recreational traveler's expenditures in this state amounted to \$47.62.

In the neighboring state of Montana the total was \$30,700,000 and the per capita expenditure was\$57.81; in California the comparative figures were \$416,800,000 and \$68.78; while in Nevada, the figures are \$13,500,000 and a per capita return that led the nation, \$135.

Nine of the 11 western states ranged among the first 15 states in the country in per capita income from

travelers' expenditures.
