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CCC Fight Fire On South Fork Salmon River

Ax, Shovel, Bucket Required Pass Thru Idaho Nat'l Forest

One fire of larger proportion broke out on the Idaho National forest last weekend on the South Fork of the Salmon river. The fire | covered pproximately six acres before it was ontrolled by a crew of 100 CCC men.

The fire was in the most rugged puntry on the South Fork, with ery few trails and being almost completely inaccessible. Cause of the fire was not determined though it was believed to have been started by lightning.

Fire fighters very realistically lived the lives of Rogers' Rangers on their march from the fire fighting country. Fifty men returned Sunday, followed by the remainder Monday. The crew walked for 13 hours, several of them collapsing and requiring the help of others. The climp out of the fire country was one mile high, requiring a walk of 14 miles by trail. A 10-man patrol covered the fire the remainder of the week.

Exceptional good luck carrying supplies by plane to the fighters was reported by officials of the forest office. The landing spot for loads was a gravel bar 100 feet long, and the pilot, Penn Stohr, lost only one load out of 23.

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The fire hazard of the forest is now in the fourth period, known as the emergency period. Everyone entering the forest must check in at stations and carry an ax, shovel, and a bucket.

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
