Food Stamp Plan To Be Inaugurated In Valley County

Valley county is one of nine others in which the federal food stamp plan will be extended as rapidly as possible as a prelude to state operation of the plan.

Donald A. Fareed of Portland, Oregon, district supervisor of the surplus marketing administration, will be in Boise March 25 or 26 to negotiate for installing the surplus commodity disposal system in Adams, Washington, Payette, Valley, Boise, Gem, Canyon, Elmore and Owyhee counties.

At present the system, under which a purchaser is given \$1 of free blue stamps for each \$2 of orange stamps purchased, is operating in Ada county and is six north Idaho counties.

The 1941 legislature provided a \$100,000 revolving fund to permit statewide use. Lee explained the money was necessary for financing purchases of stamps from the SMA and for distributing them to clients. No actual depletion of the fund is contemplated.

Idahoans will know after Fareed arrives in Boise about how long it will be before the plan will be extended over the state.

Southwestern Idaho will probably be under the program in "perhaps 60 days" and extension of the system probably will have to be done in groups of counties.

Before any area can institute the plan, regulations under which clients may purchase stamps must be formulated, food industry committees organized and arrangements made for stamp sales.

The orange stamps are good for any food item not ordinarily consumed on the premises. The blue stamps are good for any commodities designated as in surplus by the secretary of agriculture.
