
**NYA OPENS SCHOOL IN EMMETT
FOR YOUTH 17 TO 25 YEARS;
PART TIME JOBS FURNISHED**

The National Youth Administration has opened an office at the Emmett high school to serve the youth of Gem and neighboring counties. The NYA seeks to aid young people by providing part-time employment for out-of-school youth from 17 through 24 years of age on projects designed not only to afford productive work but to benefit youth generally and the community in which they live, by extending job training and counseling services for NYA youth and by promoting health and recreational activities for NYA out-of-school project workers.

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Openings now exist in the national defense training projects for young men interested in training in machine shops, welding shops, electrical shops, radio shops, foundry work, aviation mechanics, sheet metal shops, etc. Young men can secure work experience that will lead to desirable full-time, well paying jobs.

Openings also exist for young men interested in the complete agriculture course at the Weiser Regional School. This course includes work and instruction in animal, dairy and poultry husbandry, crops and soils, farm economics and management, apiculture, horticulture and farm mechanics.

The Business Training division offers boys and girls training and instruction in the major subjects of typing, shorthand, mimeoscope, mimeographing, and general office practice. Youth assigned to this division receive

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Youth assigned to this division receive
class instruction one-half day and
are assigned the other half day in
offices for actual work experience.
The office experience ranges from
simple clerical tasks to private secre-
taries.

present openings will fill rapidly. All
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young men and young women who are
out of school and who have reached
their 17th but not their 25th birthday,
who are in need of employment, are
eligible for jobs in the NYA Work
Projects Program.
