

'TENT' CITY COMPLETED AT DONNELLY FOR FARM WORKERS

"Thirty families had moved into the Donnelly Mobile Camp yesterday, as construction crews neared completion of the tent city," announced Thomas D. Sherrard, Farm Security camp manager. The camp is open to all families and single persons in agricultural work and has facilities for over two hundred persons and can be expanded if necessary to meet the housing needs of all farm workers in Long Valley during the harvest season.

"All employment of farm workers is handled through the farm placement office of the United States Employment Service located in the camp, while the Farm Security Administration provides living quarters, showers, laundry with a continuous supply of hot water, sanitary toilets, medical clinic with a full time nurse in attendance. Household, athletic and recreation equipment is available for loan to families. Plans include a nursery school and daily hot lunch for the children soon, and the erection of a large tent for community activities," said Sherrard.

The medical clinic, nursery, lunch room, and employment office serve all farm workers in the area as well as camp residents. Local families and farm workers living outside of camp will be

camp will be welcomed at the amateur shows, movies, athletic exhibitions, dances, religious services and other activities which camp residents plan to hold as soon as the camp's government is organized.

"Our job at the camp is to provide farm workers a temporary home where they can live in some comfort and where they can keep clean, healthy, and strong for the job of harvesting this year's food for victory. War conditions have reduced the number of farm workers and we are counting heavily on healthy protection, medical care and sanitation in the camp to cut down time lost by illness and accident, assuring full use of the labor that is available. Campers and management are pleased with the camp site, located 3-4 of a mile south of Donnelly on the Orville Hamilton place in a grove of pines," said Sheridan. "A deep well has been drilled and we are getting water from it."
