

Beaver Transplanting Program Underway In Idaho Counties

BOISE—(Special) — The State Fish and Game Department's annual live-beaver trapping and transplanting program got under way this week in sections of Idaho where beaver have been reported damaging irrigation ditches, canals and streams, Director Owen W. Morris announced.

The program, operating as a Pittman-Robertson Wildlife Project, is under the direction of John J. Boyle, Supervisor of Federal Aid Projects for the State.

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"This year's program will operate on the same basis as the 1939 and 1940 programs. The beaver will be taken on complaints from farmers and property owners in the lower farming districts and transplanted in higher regions of the same stream and watershed where they will be of benefit in water and soil erosion control."

State Conservation officers will assist in transplanting the beaver as well as the grazing and forest services.

"Complaints received so far this year," he added, "have been considerably less than last year."
