Trainload after trainload of recruits for the Forest Conservation camps in this county have been thru or unloaded their cargoes here filling the camps to their full quotas of 200 or more men each when all are distributed.

Luckily the Pullman trains had not yet left Cascade when the several hundred men returned to town and were held overnight so the rain-soaked recruits might have a dry place to sleep. Today camp is being made in town to care for them until they can be moved to the forest camps.
