### 1025 More Idaho Men to Join C. C. C. Workers

An additional 1025 Idahoans, aged  
18 to 25, will be sent to forest con-  
servation camps as the result of an  
order received Wednesday by Parker  
C. Carver, relief administrator for  
the state from Washington.

The men will be used to fill out  
camps already established, where the  
number of enrolled men does not  
come up to the required total. No  
new camps will be established.

Some camps now contain less than  
the 200 "enrolled" or rank and file  
workers allowed under the terms of  
the conservation act, and the ad-  
ditional Idaho men will be used to  
bring this total up to par.

The men will be enlisted as have  
the other Idaho men chosen, by the  
relief committees in the various  
counties.
