He spoke of the great work the Forest Service is going, of the miles of forest roads, trails, telephone lines and fences that come under his supervision. The boys were interested in his description of the work done by the look-out men at their posts of duty on the mountain peaks, always on the watch for the fire demon. Mr. Rice told of the vast acreage of grazing lands for cattle and sheep within the Payette Forest, how the timber lands were preserved for the lumber industry and the protection of water-sheds. He expressed himself as being very well pleased with the work Company 250 has done on the Profile Gap-Edwardsburg road. The Profile Gap crews have about two miles of road yet to go to connect with the two miles of cleared right-of-way which the advanced detachment has done up to the mouth of the canyon on Big Creek.

brush.

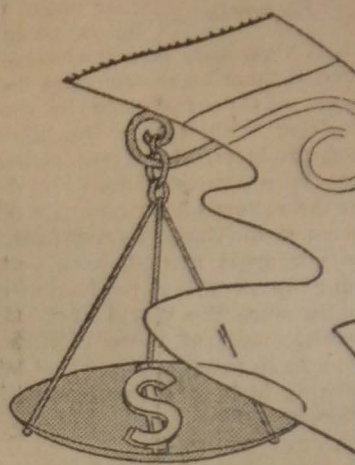
ALL EXCITED!!

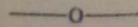
