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## VETERANS MAY NOW ENROLL FOR C. C. C. WINTER CAMP

Boise.—Enrollment of 25 additional Idaho War Veterans for the six months' winter term in the Veterans Contingent of the Civilian Conservation Corps has been authorized, it is announced by Homer Huddelson, Manager of the Veterans Administration Facility at Boise.

Veterans desiring to enroll must make application to the Manager on the prescribed form obtainable at the Boise office and at American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars and Disabled American Veterans posts, prior to September 25, 1933. Of these, 25 will be selected and certified to the C. C. C. enrolling officers. The time and place for enrolling will be announced later.

Regulations pertaining to the first enlistments will be in effect. The applicants must be physically fit for manual labor and must allot a certain portion of their pay to dependents. Veteran enlistments are not subject to age limits.

The present veterans camp, consisting of 200 Idaho and Utah former service men, is at San Leandro, California, and the Boise officials presume that the winter camp will be somewhere in that district.

There is a possibility, Huddelson said, that more than 25 men will be needed from Idaho, depending upon the reenlistments of the men now in camp who will be discharged September 30, 1933.

## NO UNFAIR PRICE FIXING UNDER

### TWO AGENCIES WORKING PROTECTION OF CONSUMERS

Washington.—The agencies which the legion of consumers turned into actual buyers throughout the country will get protection from unwarranted price raising exerting themselves in a manner to get wide approbation from civic and women's organizations.
