## Forest Conservation Program in Effect on June First

Washington— President Roosevelt's approval of amendments to the lumber code inaugurates the first comprehensive forest-conservation program in the history of the American timber industry. Effective June 1, 1934, commercial forest industries are obligated to (1) scrupulous measures by individual operators for protection against forest fires during and immediately following logging operations; (2) cooperation of forest-owning groups with public authorities in extending systematic protection against fire and other destructive agencies; (3) preservation of immature trees and young growth during logging operations; and (4) provision for restocking the land after cutting. Other provisions apply to selective logging, development of individual-management plans, and sustained-yield forest management. Conservationists all over the world have hailed this program. "June 1 will be a red-letter day in American industrial history", says the National Lumber Manufacturers' Association in a statement, "because it will mark the beginning of sustained treatment of 400,000,000 acres of land." In his letter to the President describing the hearings on the proposal, General Johnson said: "As you well know, the means of embarking on such a program has long been sought, but the divergent interests involved, while seeking a common goal, defeated each other in its attainment by failing to reconcile their opinions in the matter of detail. That this reconciliation has been possible is undoubtedly due more to your interest and leadership than to any other force."
