Government To Turn National Forests Into Park

Employment of 12,363 men and funds amounting to \$3,651,000 annually for the next five years will be devoted to recreational improvement of national forests in the intermountain region, according to estimates prepared recently by R. H. Rutledge, regional forester. Several Idaho forests will participate in the program although individual work has not been determined.

Work other than recreational development will be done, but public uses will be paramount. Half a million dollars will be spent for material and equipment each of the five years and 1049 men will be employed regularly.

If the program is approved, as seems likely, it will mean the development of more than 1000 camp grounds with stoves, tables, running water and toilet facilities. Grounds accomodating the greatest number of people will be provided with community halls, playgrounds and ampitheatres. Bath houses and swimming pools will be constructed in many. The forest service also plans to develop summer communities. In that connection building of two and four-room cottages for rental to the public through the summer season at moderate rates is being considered.

Each area will be developed so as to contribute the most possible to social well being of the local communities, Rutledge said.
