

GEORGE HIGGINS DIES AT BOISE VALLEY HOME

George E. Higgins, southern Idaho lumberman, died at his home at Ustick Wednesday evening after a long illness.

Mr. Higgins was born in New Brunswick, Canada, January 4, 1862. He lived for many years at Cascade Cabarton where he was a woods superintendent with the Boise Payson Lumber Company. Ill health ended his retirement four years ago and he went to the Boise Valley to make his home.

He was a member of Ionic Lodge 82, A. F. and A. M., at Cascade, Boise Chapter No. 3, Royal Arch Sons, of Idaho commandry No. 1, Knights Templar, of El Korah Mine, Missoula, Mont., aerie No. 31, International Order of Eagles and of Benant lodge No. 6, Independent Order of Odd Fellows at Missoula. Surviving Mr. Higgins are a son, Clarence M. Higgins of Ustick, and a brother, Hiram Higgins of Mountain View, California.

IDAHO PLEDGED TO NEW DEAL

ENTIRE DEMOCRATIC TICKET ELECTED BY LARGE MAJORITIES

Democratic State Chairman Robert Coulter's prediction of a sweeping victory for the Democratic Party in every quarter proved true with counting of returns of the General election held Tuesday.

Tabulations to date give Governor Ross, Idaho's third term governor, a majority over Frank Stephan of upwards of 15,000 with large majorities for all other Democrats on the state ticket.

Both Congressman Compton I. White and D. Worth Clark received pluralities of over 10,000.

Repeal Favored

Indications from the reports so far obtained are that the state favors repeal of prohibition by a ratio of about four to three.

Non-Partisan Judiciary

In the non-partisan judiciary race for the Supreme Court, James F. Ailshie of Couer d'Alene defeated Sam E. Blaine of Boise by a large majority while in the Seventh Judicial District Judges O. A. Sutton and John C. Rice were re-elected by large majorities.

FOR VALLEY COUNTY

In Valley County the complete State Democratic ticket went over by a large majority and of county officers, but four, Auditor, Prosecuting Attorney, Probate Judge and Coroner went to Republicans, the balance going to Democratic candidates.
