One-Fifth of Nations Population Depends On Government For Support

According to statistical reports from Washington there are over 25 million people—one out of every five in the nation—who look to the federal government for all, or a large part of their support.

These range from the President down through the army of officials and employees to the millions who are dependent upon the federal emergency administration.

Office holders and employees receiving salaries and other payments from the government—aside from processing taxes—total well over six and a half million.

The federal relief administration estimates that the average family of four has only one wage earner.

The public works administration estimated that 400,000 were employed directly and a total of over two million indirectly on public works projects. The public works administration has spent over three and a half billion dollars in the effort to relieve unemployment.

Routine employees including the White House, congress, the departments and miscellaneous commissions, and some of the numerous independent agencies created by the present administration, number about 700,000.

About 19 million are on federal relief including public works and the civilian conservation corps. Besides these we have the military and naval forces.
