Townsend Pension Plan Strongly Endorsed In This Section

"We are not discouraged," is the report of Judge Campbell, of the Cascade Townsend Club, commenting on recent newspaper accounts of opposition to the Old Age Revolving Pension Plan. "We have been expecting opposition and feel that this is only one more sign that our movement is succeeding and that we will get somewhere."

"Opposition is sure to come from those who do not understand the plan in its entirety. These people think only of the amount to be paid, \$200, and it looks large. They are not thinking of the underlying and principal aim of this movement and that it is to stimulate industry by getting money into circulation immediately and into every part of our country, for the aged are everywhere."

"Opposition will come from other people who, thinking of our net national income of forty billion of dollars, fear the sales tax would be prohibitive. This is true if we were going to tax the net national income, but this is not the plan. The plan is to tax retail sales and everyone knows that the national retail sales amount to a tremendous amount, when it is conceded that the net, after making all necessary deductions is forty billions. Statisticians for the Townsend Plan have found that our retail sales for a year amount to thirteen hundred billion of dollars. To raise the necessary twenty-six billions required to finance our plan would only require a tax of two per cent."

"The Townsend Club is fighting for a principle and will not be discouraged by newspaper reports sent out to determine sentiment and if possible sway sentiment against our movement."

SNOWFALL FOR DECEMBER ABOUT AVERAGE

Forest Ranger Lorin Wellm reports the weather conditions for December as follows:

The snowfall for the month is 29 inches, 48 inches for the season to-date as compared with 45 inches for 1933, 25 inches for 1932 and 50 inches for 1931. At this time the snow depth at Cascade is 18 inches as compared with 6 inches in 1933 and 18 inches in 1932.

The snow depth on the summit is approximately five feet, about average for a five year period. There is three feet of snow at Land Ranger Station.

The total moisture for the month was 1.83 inches, a good average.

whose lives have been free of habitual criminality, if they wish to apply for it, providing they agree under oath to retire from any paid position, giving up their place to a younger individual, and agreeing to spend the entire amount of the pension within a period of thirty days from the time of its receipt. The aggregate of these pensions will thus be forced into circulation and supply the lack of money and credit which is our chief affliction.

A demand will be made upon Congress that a law be passed immediately permitting all citizens, native or naturalized, to apply for and to receive the pension on the above terms, without strings attached, other than that they agree to spend the full amount within thirty days for commodities or for services.

It is proposed that a sum of money up to two billion of dollars, if necessary, be appropriated from the national treasury with which to make the first pension roll payment. With such a large sum placed in immediate circulation through the hands of the old folks, there can be no question but that industries and businesses of all kinds will receive a tremendous and immediate revival. The turn-over of two billions of dollars during thirty days would probably represent transactions in the amount of ten or twelve billions. Added to the three and one-half billions of business now being done per month, plus the new credit which

would be released from the banks simultaneously as a result of restored confidence, and it can be readily seen that no difficulty will be encountered in collecting from the sellers of the nation the entire amount needed to continue the pensions roll on a tax rate as low as two per cent. Commodity prices will, of course, advance to the extent necessary to

raise the tax. But competition will still prevail and the increased profits that business will enjoy, due to the increased volume of business, should prevent any undue inflation to commodity costs.

The buying power of the entire nation being thus suddenly restored (there will be no poverty-stricken region left, the old being found everywhere) and the glut of the labor market relieved, there should be an immediate rise in wages to a point comparable to the retirement pay of

the aged, at least. Thus a high level of prosperity will be reached and fully stabilized.

When this is done it will be perfectly fair as well as ample to say to all the people, "You being amply to do so, it is our duty to exact that all shall get their proportionate share of the national income necessary to maintain our national prosperity." Hence the transaction is a tax that none can escape paying, and will pay in proportion to his ability to buy."
