
CCC, DOUBLED, TO GO ON TWO YEARS

With \$6,000,000 ear marked for the Civilian Conservation Corps in the work relief bill passed by Congress plans are now under way for increasing the number of men to 600,000 and for increasing the number of camps by 1,500, according to Robert Fechner, director of Emergency Conservation Work. There are now 1,457 camps.

Upon the passage of the measure which continues the work for two years Fechner proceeded with the enrolling of 100,000 replacements to take the place of workers whose enlistment expired March 31 and bring the CCC up to its present standard of 375,000 men.

Everything is set for almost doubling the enrollment as soon as President Roosevelt issues the executive order. It is expected the Army can have the camps ready for the new men about July 1.

For reclamation, water conservation and similar items \$500,000,-000 has been designated by the work relief bill and in addition \$350,000,-000 has been set aside for soil erosion prevention, reforestation, flood control, etc.
