

Governor Ross Prepares Plans To Meet Social Security Costs

Five thousand Idahoans over the age of 65 years each will receive a \$30 monthly pension. Governor Ross announced Tuesday, as soon as the federal social security measure can be placed in operation within the next few weeks.

Of the \$30, \$15 will come from the federal coffers, \$10 from the state and \$5 from the counties.

One hundred fifty thousand dollars a month, or \$1,800,000 annually, will be required to pay the pensions.

Each county will be called upon to contribute \$5 from its fund for indigents for each person within its borders who is 65 years of age or older and who has no other means of support.

The state will obtain the \$50,000 it must contribute to the cause from the emergency co-operative relief fund, which receives \$100,000 monthly from the 2 per cent retail sales tax act.

The balance of the \$100,000, or \$50,000, will be used by the state to care for persons who are unable to earn their own livelihood, Governor Ross said.

Roughly, he said, there are 6500 unemployables on relief in Idaho at the present time. Of this number, 4000 he estimated, are over the age of 65 years. Another 1000 persons, who are not on relief rolls, but who are 65 years of age or more and dependent upon their families for support, will be eligible for the pension, his estimate showed.

The Governor's plan is designed to take care of all persons who cannot be given employment by the works progress administration, which now is engaged in taking over the employables of Idaho emergency relief administration rolls.

The employables on relief rolls will receive monthly salaries for their work on public projects designed to provide work for them.
