## ldaho CCC Camps Bring \$7,500,000 Yearly For Payroll and Food

Idaho has 79 Civilian Conservation Corps camps with approximately 15,000 men and entailing the expenditure of about \$7,500,000 yearly to keep in operation according to a recent report by CCC officials. The above expenditure is for payroll and foodstuffs only. Thousands more dollars are expended for clothing, gas and oil for trucks and other necessities in keeping the camps in operation.

The conservative figure of 14,000 at a minimum of \$30 each month per man brings the payroll each year to \$5,040,000. Food, army officers estimated, costs 50 cents per day per CCC youth, which makes the cost \$7,000 each day of \$2,555,000 per year. In addition, army officers in command, camp leaders, assistant leaders and technical personnel draw more than \$30 per month pay. Each enrollee is required to send \$25 a month home to his parents to assist in their support and take them from local relief rolls.

All supplies are purchased by competitive bids, with the exception that perishable foods are bought when needed at supply depots near the individual camps. Idaho farmers and merchants share in the business, though sometimes indirectly.

The state has been divided into five districts. In the Lewiston area there are 16 camps, including one of local men; in the Fort Wright district there are 35 camps, with three made up of Idahoans. There are nine companies in the Pocatello section, one an Idaho company, and three more are to be set up in October. Two companies are located in the Missoula district on the Idaho side of the line. The Boise area has 17 companies, six of them being filled with Idahoans.
