FIRST WPA PROJECT IN IDAHO STARTS NEAR NEW MEADOWS

Boise—High praise for the first
WPA project to be started in Idaho
was voiced by W. T. Lockwood, dir-
ectr of the National Emergency
Council for Idaho, on his return
from the Brundage creek irrigation
dam now under way ner New Mead-
ws in Adams county about a mile
and a half northwest of Brundage

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mountain off the New Meadows-Mc-
Call highway.

The dam will impound 35,000
acre feet of water for farms in the
New Meadows valley. Work was
started September 9 by a crew of
50 men. The pay is \$44 a month. It
is expected that work can be con-
tinued through the winter. A wood-
en shelter will be erected to inclose
the dam and will be heated to a
temperature sufficient to permit
work to be carried out without de-
lay through the cold months. Per-
manent camp buildings are being
erected; supplies and equipment are
being stored for the winter.

The Brundage dam will cost about
\$75,000. Of this amount, \$6000 will
be furnished by the irrigation dis-
trict sponsoring the project, and the
balance will come from WPA funds.
