

Good Idaho Farm Lands Being Investigated For Resettlement

Good farm land is now being investigated appraised and optioned in many parts of Idaho to be used for resettlement of farm families now on unprofitable land, young couples trying to establish a farm, tenant farmers desiring ownership and rehabilitation clients approved for resettlement, announces W. B. Tucker, Regional Resettlement Head, Resettlement Administration, Portland.

Only farming land with a proven production and good soil will be considered and the price of the land must not exceed what is normally being paid in the community, emphasized Tucker. Speculators and land owners asking prices above fair appraisals in areas where resettlement projects are contemplated will only force abandonment of the program in these regions and cause transfer to some other district.

Farmers and land owners having desirable land for sale are warned not to give credence to real estate agents laying claims to special influence with the Federal Government in selling a client's land for resettlement.

"All individuals having good land for sale can deal directly with the Government through the nearest resettlement officials and need not go through a real estate agency as intermediary", said Tucker. "While the Government will purchase land from real estate agencies where the price is fair, no land agency will be given preference or special considerations over individual owners.

"Optioning of land for resettlement does not supply a guarantee that the land will be purchased, but indicates the land involved is being considered for resettlement and will be purchased if a project can be set up in that particular area."
