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FEDERAL SURVEY FORECASTS INCREASED PRODUCTION IN IDAHO OVER LAST YEAR

According to a report of Richard C. Ross, federal agricultural statistician for Idaho, production of all major Idaho crops except cherries, will be greater than last year and in many cases larger than the average. Harvested acreages of all important field crops except potatoes are expected to be larger than were harvested last year. With adequate to ample water supplies in prospect, most irrigated crops are reported in good condition. Condition of crops in the non-irrigated areas, however, range from poor to good, following the unfavorable dry weather which prevailed during June. Crops in North Idaho are generally in poor condition, with most spring grains sufficiently advanced in growth that little benefit would be expected even if rains were received. Dry land grains in eastern Idaho were approaching a critical stage July 1, with rain needed badly. Observers report that fair to good crops will probably be produced in this area, but yields will be lower than expected earlier in the spring unless good rains are received shortly.
