Works Progress Program Spends Nine Million Dollars In Idaho

Expenditures totaling \$8,760,575 for Idaho's Works Progress administration program since its inception to January 1 have been announced by J. L. Hood, state administrator, in a review of accomplishments since operations began July 5, 1935.

Hood said Works Progress funds have totaled \$6,419,996 while sponsors of many political subdivisions have contributed \$2,240,579 in wages, materials, rentals and other costs.

Man hours of construction on approximately 600 projects reached 14,786 by January 1, enough to give 100 men steady jobs for more than 123 years, Hood declared. W. P. A. paid workers put in 13,986,373 man hours on projects, while sponsor-paid workers contributed 800,373 man hours.

Work undertaken has involved nearly every type of construction, ranging from highway building to skilled technical work on "white collar" projects.

WPA funds for wages totaled \$5,459,445 to January 1, while sponsors furnishing supervision contributed \$473,544 for salaries and wages. Sponsors made their largest contribution in materials at a cost of \$1,138,374 as against \$747,105 of WPA funds. Rentals and other expenses cost sponsors \$628,661, compared to \$313,446 of government contributions.

The works progress administration program is continuing through the winter months with approximately 7500 workers. At the peak of operations in February of last year, 15,000 men and women were employed by WPA.
