**PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT
IN DEMANDING REV**

President Roosevelt in talk to the nation Thursday swung into the thick of the matter his proposal to revamp the supreme court with the chief justice the court's majority had called on the nation to be "a no-man's-land of final futility." He accused the justices of rendering congress powerless to attack economic ills, and called for immediate action to "remove the legal doubts those policies create and offer a progressive solution to our problems."

Striking at his enemies and calling a "dictator" charges, he said he had no effort or intention to run for a third term in office.

In beginning his second term, President Roosevelt has set his course on these general policies:

Reorganization of the supreme court, contending that a new interpretation of the constitution is necessary in order to solve some of our national problems.

New wage and hour laws, and salvaging some features of the abandoned NRA.

Continuation of benefits to farmers cooperating in soil control through soil conservation and with new crop insurance laws and aid to
