## Public Assistance Act To Be Approved By The Federal Board

Boise, May 13—(UP)—Peter H. Cohn, state director of public assistance, today assured Governor Barzilla W. Clark that the federal social security board would approve Idaho's public assistance act within the next few days.

The Idaho bill provides relief for old aged, the blind, and for dependent children.

Cohn this week returned from the national capital where he explained provisions of the Idaho setup to the federal social security board.

He said he was definitely assured that all three assistance plans would be approved, giving Idaho a permanent social security setup.

The bill was reluctantly approved by Governor Barzilla W. Clark after the last legislative session because he thought it too "broad."

Subsequently, Attorney-General J. W. Taylor was asked for an opinion on the measure, scanned it, and reported he could find nothing of unconstitutional import in the bill.

He said there were questionable sections, but that he could not take it upon himself to assume powers in the measure would be used to contravene constitutional provisions.

Cohn said approval of federal grants for May and June would be automatic with approval of the plans, but explained that checks for May might be late due to delay in passage and signing of the federal appropriation bill for public assistance.
