sections, but that he could not take it upon himself to assume powers in the measure would be used to contravene constitutional provisions. Cohn said approval of

grants for May and June would be automatic with approval of the plans, but explained that checks for May might be late due to delay in passage and signing of the federal appropriation bill for public assistance.
