## Percentage of Traffic Deaths in Idaho is Greatest in U. S.

Death continues to reign supreme upon the nation's streets and highways with what will prabably be a toll of more than forty thousand lives sacrificed during 1937. The first eight months of this year records a toll if 24.250 American citizens who have been taken in the traffic slaughter in the "pace that kills." This is an alarming and startling increase of eleven percent over the same period in 1936--the year in which the all-time high mark of 26,500 was established, according to the announcement of the National Safety Council.

Deaths in the nation during August numbered 3,850 compared with 3,740 in the same month last year. Regarding this increase of three per cent, council statisticians pointed out the August increase of three per cent was more than matched by the fourteen per cent rise in automobile travel as gauged by gasoline consumption figures, while the eleven per cent increase since the first of this year was equalized by an identical up-swing in motor mileage.

It is expected by the council that the deaths-for-mile ratio will be lower than 1936 if the current trend holds.

Twelve states reduced their tratfic fatalities in comparison with 1936. They were: Kansas, leading with 20 per cent decrease, Maine, Arizona, Washington, Oklahoma, West Virginia, South Carolina, Virginia, Florida, Nevada, Georgia, and Iowa.

According to the figures announced by the National Safety Council. Idaho still leads the states showing the greatest increase in percentage of automobile deaths for this year. Idaho has 69 per cent with New Hampshire 68 per cent and Delaware 59 per cent for the two other low

states. The automobile fatalities in Idaho for the first eight months were 125 as compared to 90 for the same period last year. The accidents in August were 23 against 29 for the same month a year ago.
