MANY CHANGES IN

EMMETT MEN INTERESTED IN BOISE BASIN DEPOSITS

Two well known Emmett men, W. L. Clark and Dave Vahlberg, have been associated with Wm. H. Simons, former state mine inspector, Franklin Gerrard, former secretary of state and Harry C. Parson, state auditor, in placing on production one of the last remaining virgin placer deposits in the Boise basin.
