# The Week In WASHINGTON

Washington — (AP) — The Bureau of Agricultural Economics of the Department of Agriculture hopes as a result of a study it is making to determine means of eliminating what is termed "barriers" to interstate commerce of farm products.

The "barriers," officials explained are licensing requirements and taxes on out-of-state trucks; regulations dealing with weights, sizes and equipment of out-of-state trucks and port of entry laws.

Seventeen states, including Idaho, have such laws, the department said.

"State legislatures," the bureau said in a preliminary report, "have been active in passing laws and authorizing administrative regulations dealing with the weight, size, equipment and insurance of motor vehicles.

"The variety of non-uniformity of these laws have constituted an appreciable hindrance to interstate commerce; moreover, the limits set may be so low as to prevent long-distance hauling."

Harry L. Hopkins, WPA administrator, disclosed that total works progress administration employment reached 2,898,597 in the week ending July 16. In most states the number was an increase from the preceding week, in Idaho from 8,601 to 8,897.

The Public Works Administration has allocated approximately half of the huge fund appropriated to it by Congress. Officials said that in the 25 working days since the new PWA act was signed they had approved \$36,562,680 daily. President Roosevelt has authorized \$515,170,274 in grants and \$35,457,000 in loans.

Secretary of Labor Perkins considered a proposal for a nationwide rehabilitation program for the "unattached, jobless, penniless" woman of 40 who now exists on public relief. The suggestion was made by Mary Anderson, director of the women's bureau of the labor department, who recommended that such women be given medical and hospital care and occupational training.

Idaho's Senator Borah was back on his feet for the first time in nearly three weeks. An official assistant said doctors were pleased with the Senator's recuperative powers and said the Idaho solon had been "a very sick man."

William C. Cochran was named by the Federal crop insurance corporation as manager of the branch office at Spokane, Wash. He has been associated with the Agricultural Administration as a wheat specialist at Portland, Ore., since 1934.

County Auditor Forest A. Robb suggests that the following instructions be kept in mind:
