Assistant supervisors: Robert C. Tucker, Caldwell; Robert M. Keyes, Burley, and Keith D. Tovey, Boise. Home management supervisors: Beth Wood Wiley, Idaho Falls; Mabel G. Buttors, Rexburg, and Ruth B. Blackburn, Gooding.

"Continued generally low farm prices are reflecting themselves in a heavy volume of new applications in all parts of Idaho," Duffy said. "These, in addition to the present 3,995 farm families being serviced in the state through rehabilitation and cooperative loans, together with debt adjustment and approved farm and home plans, has made additional personnel imperative. There are still ample funds to meet present credit demands from farmers in the state."
