WORST MORMON CRICKET OUT-BREAK IN YEARS AFFECTS TWELVE STATES

Boise, July 21—(UP)—The worst Mormon cricket outbreak in history this week taxed efforts of a WPA army in 12 states to check and destroy hordes of the parasites which have migrated from breeding grounds to cultivated fields throughout the northwest.

Numbers of crickets migrating from waste lands to green fields have exceeded all estimates, according to Dr. P. N. Annand, a United States department of Agriculture official.

The tremendous cricket increase seeped over into South Dakota, a region which until now had been free of the pest.

Reason for the unprecedented increase was said to be weather unusually favorable for hatching, and the large number of eggs deposited by last year's swarm of the parasite.

To drive them back, hundreds of tons of sodium arsenite have been dusted over the moving bands from pneumatic guns and cultivated fields so far have been protected from extensive damage.

Miles of sheet metal barriers from 10 to 15 inches high have aided efforts of workers to herd the crickets into pits where they are burned. Oil has been spread on irrigation canals to help fight the menace to crops.

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
