M-G-M Makes Progress on Scene of Unit One

M-G-M officials said today that they believed, weather conditions being favorable, that Unit No. 1 would complete its work in about a month. Included in this unit are the three principal stars, Spencer Tracy, Robert Young, and Walter Brennan, and the director, King Vidor. Also in this unit are Isabel Jewell and Helen MacKellar who arrived in McCall from Hollywood Sunday. Eventually, when the second unit begins its work, there will be more than 1000 Indians on the set. At present there are about 360, coming from such reservations as Blackfoot, Flatheads, Nez Perce, Colville, Umatilla and Kalispell. Harold Weinberger, assistant director, is in charge of the Indians and has traveled 9000 miles in the past seven weeks, by car and plane, assembling his Indian cast. There are 310 Indian warriors, 32 women, 16 boys and girls and three papooses, the youngest one being only a few days over one month of age.

The entire village of St. Francis which will be completely burned within the next week is outfitted with gas lines, and igniting devices in such a way when the conflagration starts it will make a most spectacular blaze.

The St. Francis village is probably one of the largest outdoor sets ever constructed by any motion picture company. It is composed of 120 separate buildings, covering an area of 10 acres. All buildings are complete with four walls and a roof and are built authentically with timber cut at the Payette Lakes site. In addition to the fort and log cabins there are a great number of tepees and other buildings built of mud and similar materials, in keeping with the period of 1759.
