Plans to Establish Winter Sports Area Near Cascade Approach Extinction For Lack of Suitable Location

ASK COOPERATION OF FOREST SERVICE

Plans for the development of a winter sports area near Cascade similar to the one near Payette Lakes is still hanging fire, according to recent news pending the selection of a favorable site by some ski authority.

Several weeks ago the local Lions club put the proposition before the forest service and received a favorable comment, with the provision however, that some expert on ski sites should select the location and that the place decided upon should not be too far from the highway.

To date no further action has been taken upon the proposal, the services of an experienced planner not being available.

In the past skiers at Cascade have had to confine their efforts to the rather undersized hill north of town which can well be sized up as "inadequate." Being a south slope, the hill has drawn black thoughts from many skiers because winds blow the snow off, the sunshine melts it, and in general it causes no end of grief to those who use its slopes.

It is for those reasons that plans for improvement of the present site have not been made, efforts being made on the other hand, to find a new location that can be built into a first-class area for winter sports and ski carnivals. With this idea in mind the people of this community are asked to report to the Lions club the location of any places that meet these requirements. These places will be examined later by a ski expert and a report issued to the forest service for possible development.
