FSA Loans Benefit state legislature. Reelected Many Farm Families floor leader during the Republican I In Valley County

Since its origin in 1936, the farm security administration office in Cascade has helped 27 farm familles in Valley County get on their feet financially, according to Bob Keyes, in

charge of the local office.

Up until the first of the present year more than \$26,000 has been loaned to farmers in this country in long time, small interest loans and nearly 90 per cent of this money has been paid back when due. Keves said. Since the first of the year 11 new loans have already been made, some for long periods and some for short emergencies.

The loans are made to farmers who need seed, tools, livestock and other equipment to carry on farming operations and whose credit rating is inadequate to borrow money elsewhere. The loans are made from one to five years at five per cent interest. Efforts are made by the FSA officials to show the farmer the best way to raise crops and become selfsupporting, and at the same time to repay the loan.

At times, when a group of farmers need something they can use together, cooperative loans are made and each member of the group signs the note for his share. In this manner the entire group may obtain the benefits from something too expensive for the individual's pocketbook.

Applications are still being received at the local FSA office and any former who is interested in applying for the loans or services of the administration should call at the office in Cascade. If the applicant is eligible for help, the supervisor will be glad to go over his case and help him make out the application.
