### Motorists Warned To Use Caution Until Surface Dries

#### 40,000 PONDEROSA PINE PLANTED NEAR BANKS

More than 40,000 ponderosa pine trees have been planted recently by a CCC crew from the Garden Valley camp on 55 acres of the burned area in the North Fork Canyon above Banks, reports Supervisor Van Meter of the Payette National Forest.

These trees were grown in the Forest Service nurseries located at McCall, Tony Grove, Utah, Monument, Colorado and were produced from seed harvested last year in southwestern Idaho. Conditions this year are favorable to the survival of the small trees planted.

It is hoped that each year, Mr. Van Meter said, trees may be planted so that within a short time the burned area which will not naturally revegetate, may be stocked with trees.

## Relics Of Indian Days Discovered In Bank Of Road Near Here

Relics of the days when the Sheep-eater Indians were the inhabitants of Long Valley, were brought to light this week as Raymond Conyers discovered four chipped stones while working on the highway. Largest in the collection is a nine and one-half inch tomahawk chipped from some white stone. It is in a fine state of preservation and should be valuable.

After several months of almost unmitigated isolation the residents of the mountain settlements of Yellowpine, Ten Lake, Milwate and Bug Creek are once more able to drive to civilization this week as road crews from the forest service and the Milwate men pined open the Big Creek and Ten Lake summits.

Although the road is still soft in many spots and not yet adapted to heavy hauling, many light trucks and pickups have been traversing the road since its opening Monday night. Also upon the list of supplies going to the back country was gasoline of various grades. Although some of the rigs in the back country were open top one ago car crossovers have been able to drive because of an acute shortage of gasoline.

Local service crews are busy repairing the road now and it is expected that they will have it in shape for heavy hauling before the last of the month.

"The opening of the road gave many of the persons who have been in the back country an opportunity to get out and reacquaint themselves with civilization and there has been a practically increasing number coming to the road the last few days. Local service have been taking advantage

## Carl Brown Elected Democratic National Committeeman

Valley County again burst into the limelight Thursday, when its senator, Carl E. Brown of McCall, was elected Idaho Democratic national committeeman, at the party's delegate convention held at Twin Falls.

Senator Brown will succeed Ramsey Walker, retired Coeur d'Alene banker, who rose after the vote was announced and moved that Brown's name be made unanimous. Mr. Brown on the first ballot received a vote of 120 1-10 to Walker's 110 9-10.

Former Attorney General Martin placed Senator Brown's name in nomination with a ringing appeal for a solid and harmonious front in the coming election.

He termed Senator Brown "a Democrat, a gentleman and a worker; a self-made man, reviewed his three terms in the Idaho senate and added:

"He is not a man who has made his money from clipping coupons from bonds and loaning money."

The nomination was seconded by former state senator A. L. Frechster of Boise.

Valley county was further honored at the democratic state meeting when Sallie Callender of Cascade was chosen as one of the party's delegates to the democratic national convention.

Dr. R. C. Ward, Republican county chairman, said today, regarding Senator Brown's election:

"In as much as it was impossible to select a good republican as democratic national committeeman, we are proud that Carl Brown of McCall was given this honor. We feel that by so honoring Mr. Brown credit is reflected upon the entire county."

## Project To Begin As Soon As Funds Are Released

Construction of the Cascade reservoir is practically a clash, with an appropriation of \$1,100,000 for the project awaiting only the President's signature. The announcement reached the Cascade News today just a few moments before going to press.

Further, according to the information, this work will be placed under contract at the earliest possible date.

Prior to today, all information available in regard to the appropriation for the Cascade dam was that some time ago the House of Representatives had approved an appropriation of \$700,000. Since then an effort to have the amount increased to more than a million dollars was approved by the senate, following which occurred a conference of House and Senate committees agreed on the \$1,100,000 appropriation. This item is now included in the Interior appropriations bill which now goes to the President for his signature. As soon as it is signed the funds will be available.
