Fire Season Starts In Valley County; 500 Fighters Busy

With the sudden influx of a heat wave, Valley county has become the site of a right nice collection of forest fires almost overnight. And forest men are getting to the point where they toss sleeplessly at night and count CCC boys instead of the customary sheep in efforts to woo Morpheus.

Thursday there were nine fires, large and small, burning over the county. The Deadwood vicinity lead the lot with four blazes, two small ones and two that were keeping nearly 200 fire fighters busy. Two more were reported close to home as the mountains west of Arling became the scene of fires covering several acres. Gaugen Valley, Pistol Creek and Custer Creek also reported one fire each.

Late Thursday the Payette forest service reported all the fires were well in hand except the two largest ones near Deadwood that periodically got out of control. About 200 fire fighters are at work on these two blazes. Supervisor Thomas Van Meter of the Payette forest reported after a plane trip over this area that the crews were making headway and should have the fire subdued in a very short time.

In all, about 500 men are busy on the various fires at the present time. Most of these hiked to the fires while several were rushed in by airplane. Food and supplies are being taken in by the Johnson Flying Service.

Short wave radio is being used extensively by the forest service this year. Small portable sets accompany the fire fighters on all of the larger blazes and these are used to communicate with the head office and airplanes that fly over the blaze and direct the men below.

These, with the extensive telephone network through the forest enables rangers at the fire to keep in close contact with headquarters. It is estimated that this equipment has saved several thousands of acres of forest from fire and has saved the government a great deal more in actual cash outlayed for supplies and men.

Oscar Pritzl Dies In Missoula, Montana Following Accident

Friends of Oscar Pritzl, long familiar here as a mechanic for Johnson Flying Service, will be grieved to learn of his death Thursday night in Missoula, Montana as the result of an accident.

Oscar was fueling a plane preparatory to taking off for Cascade early Thursday morning when he lost his balance and fell from the wing of the plane to the concrete ramp. He struck his head on the ramp and suffered a fractured skull.

He was immediately rushed to the hospital in Missoula and placed under the best medical aid available but his injuries were so serious he died about 2:00 a. m. Friday morning.

Oscar was well known and universally liked around Cascade and many persons will feel they have lost a real friend in his passing. He was employed by Johnson Flying Service for several years here as a mechanic and had obtained his private pilot's license only a short time ago.

Complete information concerning his relatives was not available before press time Friday, but it is known that he is survived by a brother, Art Pritzl, in Missoula and his mother who lives near New Plymouth. He also has several brothers and sisters.

Funeral arrangements have not been announced yet.
