Dam Approved By President; Construction Sure

MUCH WORK TO BE DONE IN THIS COMMUNITY DURING NEXT TWO YEARS

Construction of the dam at Cascade was virtually assured last week as President Roosevelt put his signature on the bill which makes provisions for the local project. Owing to the delay in presidential approval, many persons thought the bill had been vetoed.

The dam and supplemental work will cost about \$3,000,000 when it is entirely completed and will furnish water for irrigation and power in the Emmett valley.

When actual construction work will begin is not yet known, contracts must be let and equipment moved to the site before things will get under way. A large amount of work and money must be spent moving the highway and railroad above the water line and the entire territory covered by water must be cleared of every tree and post. Buildings now on property to be under water must be moved to higher ground or destroyed.

Several routes have been surveyed for the railroad and highway but officials have made no definite statement as to where they will finally be built. However, it is expected that they will run along the range of low hills east of town. The highway will probably cross the river on the dam.

The dam itself will be a concrete and earth structure and will be built a few hundred yards above the site of the present power dam. It will be 90 feet high, 800 feet across at the top and 400 feet at the bottom. It will cost about \$1,000,000.

The peak capacity of the dam will be about 750,000 acre feet, larger than Arrowrock and Deer Flat combined. Water from here will be used to irrigate several thousands of acres of desert land in the lower Payette Valley and will also act as a stabilizer for the government power plant at the Black Canyon dam.

Although the dam proper will not be large, the work of clearing the ground and moving the highway and railroad is expected to take at least two years.

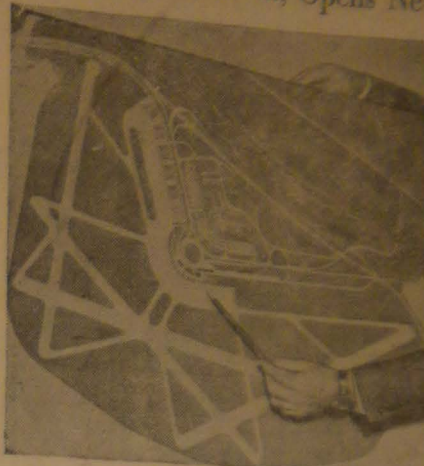

Water Shortages Costly To Farmers On Irrigation Lands

Every deficiency of irrigation water in Southwestern Idaho costs the farmers of the district \$7 per acre-foot, according to computations released by the Southwestern Idaho Water Conservation Project, Inc. based upon federal crop value census.

This condition, plus the fact that water shortages are showing a tendency to increase in frequency and severity, has led the project officers to initiate a long range, comprehensive program of additional water storage in the various river valleys of the district.

For example, the report shows, in 1924, one of the driest years on record in Boise Valley, that the farmers of the Boise project alone lost an estimated \$3,150,000, while the damage to businesses in the valley because of reduced farm purchasing power amounted to some \$1,750,000.

Almost comparable in severity to the 1924 drought was that in 1931 when, corporation officials estimate, the loss to farmers was \$3,000,000.

In other words in the five short water years, 1924, 1926, 1928, 1931 and 1934 Boise Valley farmers suffered direct losses due to lack of irrigation water, totalling nearly \$11,500,000. That money would provide quite a respectable storage capacity in Boise Valley.

At present, through efforts of the project and affiliated agencies, appropriations have been obtained which assure construction of the 100,000 acre-foot Cascade Reservoir in the watershed of the Black Canyon of the Snake and the great Arrowrock Reservoir on the Snake River. The project also is planning a 100,000 acre-foot reservoir on the Snake River.

JAMES RUSSELL FATHER OF DEATH DIES IN BOISE

James Russell, Merlyn Francis, sheriff, died last Tuesday at a hospital, it has been learned.
