Defends Policies for Last Two Years

Electrical Engineer For Rural Project To Arrive Soon

The Board of Directors of Long Valley Power Cooperative, Inc., at a special meeting held Wednesday, October 2, 1940, at Donnelly, hired Norman Mackenzie, Consulting Engineer to survey and map the proposed Rural Electrification Project in Valley county. The engineer is expected to come to Donnelly right away and get the project started in the immediate future. The Cooperative feels that it is particularly fortunate to get Mr. Mackenzie as he has had experience in R. E. A. projects for nearly three years, having engineered several in and around Idaho, and being well recommended by R.E.A.

In making his survey, the engineer will of course map the project according to the present prospective users who have signed up and made applications for electric service, the board advises, and the lines will be run for the convenience of those who have, or in the immediate future will sign up for the electric energy. Any persons desiring this service are advised that they should make their applications now, so that lines may be run to their places from funds allocated for this project. Otherwise, if they desire the service later on, they will have to purchase their own transformers, build their own lines, or wait until an additional loan can be obtained for extending the electric service to them.

The work of obtaining right of way easements is progressing nicely, according to Randall Wallis, attorney for the local R.E.A. project, and he expects the engineer to have completed his survey within the next few weeks so that the Cooperative will then be in a position to make its application for a loan and get the construction of the project under way.

Cascade Lions To Be Sponsors Of Eye Clinic

The local Lion's Club, in conjunction with the American Red Cross will sponsor an eye clinic in Cascade within the next few weeks. The organization in the local schools has disclosed a dozen or more children with poor vision, and this clinic will afford the necessary follow-up examinations. Loans will be made by the Club to families which cannot afford to pay for this service and the loans may be repaid in monthly or bi-monthly installments.

This service club, which is 15 years old in Cascade, has been building an enviable record for its work in Safety is especially worthy. It has conducted safety classes for the past two seasons and is an active sponsor of the town safety patrol.

Mr. Ph. Soulen, State Highway Inspector, was a guest of the Lions last Monday. During a brief and interesting discussion, Mr. Soulen told the Lions some interesting facts. “In the ten years between 1930 and 1940, the population of Idaho increased but three per cent. During the same decade, however, the number of pupils attending high schools in Idaho increased eighty-seven per cent. Naturally more money is being spent on education,” said Mr. Soulen. Mr. Soulen went on to say that he can recall a visit he made to the state 35 years ago, when there was not one first-class high school in Idaho. Lewiston, Emmett, and Boise had only two-year high schools.
