Most Destructive Fire This Season Endangers Andy Little Sheep Ranch

Destructive flames which have consumed more than 100 acres of timber land, have been put under control in the Payette National Forest, as 500 men—CCC enrollees and civilian volunteers—battled to extinguish the conflagration.

The fire started at 11 a. m. Monday in a grove of lodge-pole pine located six miles south of Landmark. By the time available firefighters reached the scene, more than 100 acres had caught fire.

Boise, Emmett, McCall, Cascade and Warm Lake furnished 350 volunteer fighters. CCC camps in the vicinity of Cascade supplied an additional 150 men. Fighters battled the blaze all night, but failed to bring it under control.

A forest official said that the Landmark fire was one of the largest this year in the Payette forest.

The Andy Little sheep ranch is located three miles from the fire. Forest officials said, however, that it was out of danger unless a strong wind blew the flames out of control and in the direction of the ranch.

The fire is in a primitive region which is accessible only by an unimproved, little traveled road which runs from Landmark south to Deadwood reservoir. Travel continued on the road despite the fact that fire crossed it in several places.

Other forest areas, however, were quiet. The Idaho and Boise national forest offices said that no fires had been reported in the last two days in their respective areas.
