Long Valley Farmers Assured Electricity By Washington, D. C.

Long Valley farmers were virtually assured of having electricity some- time within the next year with the arrival of a letter this week from Washington, D. C., verifying the statement made some time ago that \$119,000 had been allotted to the Rural Electrification Project in Valley coun- ty.

The letter was read at the meeting of the Long Valley Power Coopera- tive board of directors in Donnelly, Friday.

Norman McKenzie, the engineer who mapped out the valley for the building of power lines, has been elected as chief supervisor of the pro- ject. Mr. McKenzie will arrive in the valley Saturday to meet with the power board.

It is expected that a great many important phases of the project will be discussed at the meeting in prepa- ration for an early start in actual operations.

A meeting of the board of directors was held Friday but important mat- ters were postponed until McKenzie could be present to give his opinion on them.

At the present time 323 prospective users of the electricity have signed up with the local corporation and 113 miles of power lines will be construct- ed to serve them.

The lines may be extended if the demand is great enough but this will not be known until later.

In the meantime, all rural residents who wish to use electricity were urg- ed to sign up immediately with the board at their Donnelly headquarters.
