Fine Opportunities Offered Enrollees In This District

A considerable number of former G.O.P. enrollees from camps in and adjacent to Valley county are now holding responsible and attractive positions throughout the country.

This point was brought out by local G.O.P. officers in connection with the opening on May 29, the beginning of a new enrollee period.

All camps in this vicinity have a considerable number of vacancies. The camps, in addition to being ideally located from an enrollee's viewpoint, offers educational opportunities second to none.

Among former local G.O.P. enrollees who have made good are three former company clerks who are now sergeants in the U. S. army; an entire crew of men who are now employed by M-K in Wicks and Guern the entire caterpillar crew which is now seeing service near Tocoma on a United States national defense project; Paul Halford, a former infirmary attendant, now attending U. S. Medical college in Chicago at Uncle Sam's expense, and many others.

In the forestry camps of this area many opportunities are offered these young men in learning to operate heavy equipment such as draglines, caterpillars, graders and trucks, all of which experience, it is pointed out, becomes very valuable in the industrial world.

They are taught road construction, use of the jack hammer, powder, compression work, carpentry, care of tools and machinery and dozens of other things in the same category. They are also taught cooking, baking, store-keeping, typing, filing and all phases of clerking.

In addition, officers point out, educational opportunity is offered young men whereby they can take subjects toward high school graduation. Such awards are accepted by all high schools in the district and throughout the middle west and east.

Grange to Sponsor County Fair Next October

A county fair, under the auspices of the Valley County Grange, was discussed during organization at its recent meeting. The date of the tentative show set for the committee discussed.

Food Stamp Plan Inaugurated in Valley County

Valley County, with its southwestern Idaho counties, is one of the first counties in the state to inaugurate the food stamp plan. The counties coming under the plan are Boise, Owyhee, and Canyon.

Opening of the plan for a month of preparatory work by county commissioners, county public assistance directors, various business groups, warrents and members of WPA, and the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture all cooperated in the plan in effect at 10 o'clock.
