Forest Personnel Attend Two-Day School at Grimes Pass

"If you successfully wrestle a man, you must know where to take a hold and what to do with the man after you get a hold on him. The same principle applies to fighting forest fires. You first find a point of attack and then proceed to put out the fire," said A. L. Bunch, Assistant Forest Supervisor of the Payette National Forest.

District forest rangers and other Payette Forest personnel attended the two-day training school that closed Tuesday evening. The meeting was held at the Gallagher CCC camp at Grimes Pass. John W. Parker, in charge of fire control on the Payette Forest, conducted the classes.

Proper methods in suppressing forest fires were studied and practiced by putting out fires on the ground. Large areas were laid out to demonstrate organizing, training, and managing large crews in fire suppression work.

Parker emphasized in this training that "the objective in fire suppression was to be able to get the fires under control as soon as possible. To accomplish this, it is necessary to know the jobs that need to be done as well as organize and manage crews on fires."

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
