Western Ranchers End Idaho Tour In Valley County

About 150 Long Valley people joined with 300 out-of-state visitors, western range men and their wives from 17 different western states, in helping wind-up in Valley county, the Idaho tour taken by this group. During the tour a study had been made of agricultural and range conditions of the state.

The last stop on the tour was made at McCall, where the feature of the Thursday evening meeting was a mammoth barbecue at Sylvan Beach, with Long Valley beef heading the menu. Imported especially for the occasion was H. Staelin of Pocatello—a barbecuer of no mean ability. Proof of his culinary powers was the rapidity with which the big barbecued beef disappeared.

It was no small job barbecuing the beef, but the excellent results obtained, according to everyone, must have been well worth the effort. It was necessary to construct a special barbecue pit, which in itself took 40 sacks of cement to build. It was erected by C. C. C. boys.

Chef Staelin and his assistant O. B. Beck, cooked the beef for nine hours. Mr. Staelin has a special condiment mixture, procured in old Mexico and known only to himself, which was applied to the beef every 15 minutes through the roasting period.
